



#### KEY TERMINOLOGY

A general or umbrella term that collectively refers to First Nation, Metis, and Inuit in Canada. Given that it founded in the Canadian Constitution, it is a term often used in legal circles.

Distinct Group of Indigenous Peoples who remain culturally and linguistically diverse.

Refers to the federal legislation that governs First Nations within Canada.

Distinct group of Indigenous Peoples. Historically located in the Arctic.

A general or umbrella term used to describe an First Nation.


Administrative space/function of a Nation. Often used to describe where staff, Chief and Council work.

A historical term used to describe Metis people with English and Protestant lineage. The term is considered derogatory, but it was used in government reports.

An all-encompassing term used when referring to First Nation, Inuit, and Metis. Comes from UNDRIP Distinct group of Indigenous Peoples with historical ties to Red River Manitoba.






#### Indigenous Procurement

- Set targets
- Follow community recommendations
- Review your procurement & RFP process
- Review your payment processes
- Understand the stats around Indigenous businesses
- Be prepared to be flexible/adaptable
- Self-identification





### Indigenous HR

- Review your bereavement policies
- Review your self-identification policies
- Developing dedicated resources
- Develop relationships with schools, communities, Indigenous organizations, etc
- Self-identification
- Indigenous employee groups
- Cultural awareness and trauma-informed training





#### Indigenous Recruitment, Retention and Promotion

- Utilize community contacts
- Mentorship & Sponsorship
- Incorporate a collectivist approach into interviewing
- Traditional Indigenous Practice Leave
- Elder Support
- Health and Wellness Benefits include traditional practices/medicines
- Examples Deloitte & Telus






#### Incorporating Traditional Knowledge

- Elders and Youth Council
- Inviting community members into the planning process
- Incorporating Indigenous languages, art, etc.
- Elders in residence
- Establish international Indigenous circles/groups (e.g., INDIGI-X)
- Visit with Indigenous organizations, colleagues, etc.,





#### Other initiatives

- Environment, Social, and Governance (ESG)
- Connecting it to other commitments but not overlapping
- Diversity, Equity, & Inclusion (DEI)
- International Indigenous advocacy
  - Water and land
  - Indigenous women & gender based violence
- International partnerships and connections



## Summary of Key Learnings

- Indigenous Peoples had complex and diverse governance structure, world views and ethics that guided their interactions and processes.
- Indigenous values and code of ethics are focused on co-existing and incorporating multiple worldviews.
- Indigenous frameworks are still relevant today and can be applied in various ways.


